The Writing Revolution

As part of our school improvement target, an area of improvement that has been identified in the school strategic plan is 'Writing'. In moving forwards as a whole school site and supporting all of our students, we are in the process of planning to engage in the 'The Writing Revolution' program.

The Writing Revolution provides teachers with an evidence-based and proven instructional methodology, the Hochman Method. The approach rests on explicit, carefully sequenced instructions, building from sentences to compositions. The program is designed to be adaptable to and embedded in the content being taught in any subject area and at any grade.

There are six key principles of the program, which can be found on The Writing Revolution web page. As part of setting days aside for training (**pupil free days**), these days will be heavily influenced by when we can work with the writing team. Once the days have been finalised, we will seek approval and ratification of the days from Governing Council and the Education Director. Further updates will be communicated to all families.

Senior School News

There is a lot of information that comes into the school around careers, VET, universities, TAFE, scholarships etc. All relevant information is passed onto students through Microsoft Teams either through their Home Group or PLP class. Please encourage your children to check out the information regularly so they can keep up with the many options and experiences available to them. Champions English Excursion – We would like to thank Michelle and Roger Coles at Cinema Augusta for supporting our students in seeing Champions in week 9. We received some very positive feedback from Michelle about our students - "They were polite, cheerful and just so well-mannered it is a credit to your staff, the school and to the students themselves. Their conduct was impeccable. Please convey our sincere thanks for taking such good care of our cinema and their amazing behaviour."

Tertiary and Careers Expo – A group of twenty Yr 10-12 students attended the Expo with Mrs Bury and Mr Ktenidis at the Convention Centre last week. While the main focus was on options for study on leaving high school, there were a number of large employers such as Police SA and Aurizon present. What came through quite clearly from educators and employers was the need for workers with skills in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) 75% of the world's fastest-growing *occupations* require STEM skills and for us in Australia, this means employment in industries such as Defence, Renewable Energy, Health and Cyber Security. Our Year 10s and 11s will be completing Work Experience this year and we strongly encourage them to think broadly about their future options. There are also a number of apprenticeships and training options in some interesting industries eg Aurizon and Department for Correctional Services available to Yr 11/12s right now – some local and others in Adelaide.

Year 11 Spotlight

It has been a very busy, and productive, term for our year 11s. Their visit to the Careers Expo recently certainly was worthwhile. Students found the people at the stalls very friendly and provided them with information ranging from SATAC details about university entrance and army service to engineering companies. In their words, "it was a very good eye opener".

Legal Studies students have been analysing various legal issues and researching cases in the media. This included an oral presentation to the class. One of these cases from their research will form the basis for the major investigation task next term.

Information Processing and Publishing students are using their graphic manipulation skills to produce some very creative work. They must ensure they follow the design principles for effective design and thoroughly research and plan their work as part of the designing process. Next term they will start developing web pages.

In English, students have spent most of this term on a novel study for Craig Silvey's *Jasper Jones*. They have gained an understanding of the purpose, context and audience for the text and then completed transformations from the narrative perspective of a secondary character.

Work Experience planning has been the focus for Pathways students. As part of the Child Protection Curriculum, they have also been learning about risk-taking including looking at vaping, psychological pressures and manipulation, and the rights and responsibilities of the child.

In Modern History, students have studied the causes and impacts of the Russian Revolution, completed a source analysis of Rasputin and debunked the theory that Anastasia survived the assassination of the royal family. Students have just completed a study into influential figures and have had to argue their case about whether their chosen person was a hero or a villain.

Visual Arts students have been working on their folios. The folio is a combination of experiments, artist research and analysis of a famous artist and their artwork. The folio is a summary of the final practical piece, which they will complete at the end of term two. Inspired by other artists and their work, their research, and their own personal touch, the folio will support students to develop a final product. The experiments in their folios allow students to trial different techniques, mediums, and materials to give them a feel for what they enjoy in the art world and what they want to use to create their final product!

In Stage 1 PE they are finalising their Performance Improvement Biomechanics task. Each student chose a performance skill that they wanted to improve. This was done by comparing themselves to elite athletes. After the comparison students needed to outline who performed the skill better and the modifications needed to improve performance. In class, they have been conducting volleyball skill assessments in preparation for their Physical Activity Investigation. The class has decided to have three teams of pairs and are finalising any modifications to the rules, competition schedule, and picking the pairs based on the data they've collated from the skill assessments. Once the competition begins they will be required to analyse everyone's participation rates through inclusivity and performance.

Design & Technology students have completed assessment task AT1 — Design and Development of Waterfall End Coffee Tables. The task included computer-aided design (CAD — Sketchup) to develop their individual design, identifying dimensions, how it is to be constructed, and the types of joints to be used in the construction. The entire construction will be without the use of screws, all connections will be with timber joints and glue. Students are currently working on the construction of these projects in the workshop, with consideration given to both aesthetics and the use of recycled timbers. Skills learnt throughout this project will support individual projects in term 2. Hopefully, early in term 2 we will have some photos to show you!

Year 11 Food & Hospitality students have completed two tasks this term; a high risk foods practical as well as a practical focused on decorating cupcakes. Students set up a stall at lunch time and sold their cupcakes to staff and students. Next term students are moving on to their Investigation, followed by the group task with Yr 12

Food & Hospitality students.

They all definitely deserve a holiday!









4/5/6 - Technology cooking

This term the 4/5/6 class have been looking at sustainability and gardening as part of Technology. Part of our learning was to plant and grow our own produce for cooking. Unfortunately, due to the hot weather, and additional school commitments in term 1, we were not able to have produce ready to cook. We did spend time out in the garden tidying and preparing for new planting. Mrs Keller brought zucchinis from her garden at home, and we made Choc Zucchini





I am currently in my fourth year of a Bachelor of Education (Secondary), Bachelor of Arts, and have been given special authority to begin my teaching career at Booleroo. I still partake in university assignments, placements and online classes, as well as teaching a 0.6 load at BCDS.

In term 2 I have a placement, which means I will be working a full teacher (1.0) load for the first 6 weeks of the term. Language and Autism

The range of conditions that affect cognitive functions, such as thinking, attention, memory and impulse control are collectively known as neurodiverse conditions or neurodiversity.

Neurodiversity refers to differences in people's skills and abilities; for example, some people have an outstanding memory but find comprehension difficult.

Autism is a type of neurodiversity.

The language used around autism has changed in the last few years.

Most adults on the autism spectrum prefer to describe themselves as autistic or neurodivergent. Neurodivergent means a person with a neurodiversity brain.

Some autistic individuals prefer the phrase 'on the autism spectrum'.

It is always good to ask your young person (or their family, if appropriate) what they prefer.

We do not use the term ASD unless referring to a diagnosis as the D has been dropped by most people and organisations.

We do not use the term "with autism" as some autistic people have explained that they find this problematic.

You may have heard the term "masking". Autistic masking (also described as camouflaging, compensation, and most recently "adaptive morphing") is the conscious or unconscious suppression of natural autistic ways of being and the use of alternatives across a range of domains including social interaction, sensory experience, cognition, movement and behaviour.

When people have additional learning differences or disabilities, these are referred to as "co-occurring" needs (rather than the medical term "comorbid"). Rosie Simpson, Autism Inclusion Teacher

Bearing this in mind, numerous students placed or won events which is an outstanding achievement. However, others competed for the first time which is an accomplishment they should be proud of and they'll be better for the experience. Several students achieved personal bests in their event - well done!

It was great to see the interaction of our athletes with the other MNSEC schools, but also the excellent sportspersonship that was shown during or at the completion of each event. Chatting with numerous students, it was obvious they enjoyed measuring their abilities against such high-quality athletes and were happy they took up the opportunity they earned from all their hard work at the MNSEC Athletics carnival.

Congratulations to the team; the boys finished in 3rd position, the girls in 5th, and our combined score placed us in second behind Scotch College. This is an incredible effort and will promote the MNSEC Team to Division 1 of the B Grade Championships next year.

Well done to Che Lee-Bruce who achieved a State Standard for his Javelin, throwing an impressive 40.7m, eclipsing the required 34.50m to achieve the standard. Kiera Mount jumped 4.54 metres and missed out on achieving a standard by 1 cm in her long jump, which improved her jump from Sports Day by 62cm. To achieve a standard, you must finish in the top five per cent of all competitors from any division in the state. A huge feat and it deserves to be recognized accordingly.

Thank you to Amanda Bowman and all the other PE Coordinators who helped organise the day. Gayle Bury helped with the BCDS contingent of the team and did a stint at the discus. Thank you for your support, Gayle. Thanks to all the parents and family members who transported competitors to and from Adelaide; it is a big commitment and is truly appreciated by the school and no doubt the students.

That concludes Athletics for the Year 7 to 12 students this year; it was another exceptional year of accomplishments for the school, students and wider community. Everyone should be proud of what they achieved this year. Our attention now shifts to some Statewide Sports, MNSEC 7/8 and 9/10 carnivals, and the MNSEC Cross Country at Wilmington.

The Booleroo Centre and Orroroo volunteer teams respond to the community for chest pain, breathing ms or pre-existing medical conditions, and on occasion, trauma cases

Acting Mid North Yorke Operations Manager Hayley Rogers said volunteers train

they were always ready to answer the call.

"Our volunteers nominate when they are on shift at a time when it suits them," Hayley said.

"We've got a great group at Booleroo Centre and Orroroo, and we're looking forward to meeting any ne recruits who want to give it a go," she said.

Volunteers gain experience and nationally-recognised qualifications in pre-hospital care, meet new people and support their communities.

New recruits do a combination of online and face-to-face training, and are always paired with a qu officer while on a call.

"SAAS provides training, uniform and reimburses out of pocket costs such as travel and childcare,"

"Some of our people have gone onto careers in health, in a variety of positions, after receiving an insight into the sector through volunteering for SAAS," she said.

A fully qualified volunteer Ambulance Officer is awarded a Certificate IV in Healthcare once their train

Volunteers and their families also receive free Ambulance Cover whilst volunteering for their communities with SAAS.
